After running a series of medical tests, Birdie was diagnosed with kidney disease. While not life-threatening, her condition requires daily injections to live comfortably.

It can be hard to find an adopter willing to take home a senior pet, much less one who is willing to provide this level of care. But we were sure somebody would fall in love with her as quickly as all of us had.

Birdie's cute little chirps would attract every visitor to her room in the adoption center. Potential adopters loved Birdie's personality, but giving daily injections was a big commitment.

He decided that the connection he felt with Birdie was undeniable. Our medical team took the time to teach him how to inject fluids until he could do it like a professional!

Madeline was a Hot Mess!

Madeline came to Berkeley Humane with a host of health problems. The 14-yearold Miniature Schnauzer was in bad shape, so the medical team jumped to work. They immediately ran tests on the sweet older dog, doing blood work and taking radiographs to better understand her health issues. Madeline had a heart murmur, anemia, severe dental disease, stiff and ataxic hind limbs, kennel cough, and goopy eyes.

The radiographs helped the team discern the root of Madeline's gait problems. We called in a radiologist to perform an echocardiogram and abdominal ultrasound of Madeline, which confirmed the team's fear: Madeline would need to undergo an urgent procedure to remove a mammary mass.

Madeline underwent multiple procedures, including mass removal, spay, and dental extractions. After surgery, Madeline successfully recovered in a loving foster home, where she became a champion lap-sitter. In all, Madeline was in our care for almost 100 days. Given Madeline's gentle and loving disposition, it came as no surprise that she found a new, loving home with a doting family.

Hernias Were Only the Beginning

Tulip, a 5-year-old dachshund mix, arrived with a huge mass in her abdomen. The Berkeley Humane medical team found bilateral inguinal hernias. She was also diagnosed with pyometra, a life-threatening infection of the uterus that can inflict older female dogs that are not spayed.

To make matters much worse, Tulip was heartworm positive. Dogs get heartworm from infected mosquitoes when they are not on a monthly heartworm preventative.

Tulip's infected uterus was removed, and her inguinal hernias were repaired. She recovered well, but required an additional surgery on the inguinal hernia a few weeks later.

Then Tulip had to undergo the long, difficult treatment for heartworm disease. Treatment takes many weeks to complete, during which time she was still at risk because the dying heartworm could clog a blood vessel and cause severe injury or death. That is why treatment also requires strict cage rest while the heartworms die.

Thanks to a devoted team of volunteers and staff eventually the day came when Tulip was completely recovered, and we were finally able to find this very special dog a new loving home. Caring for a dog with multiple complicated medical conditions is never easy, especially for a long length of stay. Thank you to all of our donors who provide the resources to give Tulip, and the other dogs with similar stories, a new chance at a happy and healthy life.
